Directors' Report

2001 has been another year of growth with a record number of visitors attending our Centre. We have sponsored three well-attended public events, a genealogy workshop, and improved our communication with members. We have also enjoyed increasing volunteer participation and received adequate financial support to maintain our programs. This report outlines our major achievements last year.

We are pleased to report that a member of our community, Agnes Neustaedter, has directed that a portion of her estate pass to our Society upon her death. She passed away in 2001 and we have received the funds and deposited them in our endowment fund. Interest from this fund contributes to our annual operating budget. We are thankful for this generous gift.

Memorial Wall

We now have 37 wall plaques on display at our archive office. This is a lasting and visible tribute to people we have chosen to honour. Please come in to see the "wall" and if you have not yet participated in this project, please consider making this a family project. A tax-deductible donation of \$500 will buy one plaque, a major proportion of which will go into our Endowment Fund and thus make a lasting contribution to the Society. A number of families have shared in making these memorial donations. Receipts are issued to participating family members.

Special Projects

Our Society has been a major contributor to the microfilming of some 120,000 pages of documents in the Zaporozhe Regional Archive and the Zaporozhe Communist Party Archive. This work has been done under the supervision of Dr. Harvey Dyck and has required sensitive negotiations and much persistence over a four-year period. These records have now been received. A "draft" copy of the English-language inventory and users' guide is available at our Centre.

We have co-funded with four other Mennonite archives the acquisition of 14,000 pages of records from the Odessa Archives which covers the period 1847-1852. These five microfilms, along with a translated index, were received in November 2000 from Dr. Paul Toews in Fresno who is heading this initiative.

We have also received another microfilm from the Odessa Archives of 764 pages relating to the period 1800 to 1812. Tim Janzen of Portland Oregon was instrumental in acquiring this material and it is excerpted from a larger collection of 6 microfilms because it contains materials of specific interest to Mennonite genealogists.

We have committed to co-fund with the other Mennonite archives another acquisition of some 1,000 to 10,500 pages of records from the Odessa Archives covering the period 1852-1856. Paul Toews of Fresno is again managing this process.

Most of the above material is in the Russian language and some of this material had been translated on a co-ordinated basis by the participating archives. We have co-funded with CBC a Russian student from a Christian college to help us translate selected portions of these Russian records.

Board of Directors

As Chair of the board, I would like to acknowledge the contribution of individual board members to the work of the Society. This is a volunteer board whose members devote considerable time and effort on your behalf. I would also like to welcome Mr. Henry Martens to our board who has consented to replace the late Bill Riediger.

Financial Support

Once again we like to thank our growing membership for contributing to the work of our Society. We believe that our work honours God as well as our forebears who served our community faithfully. We also acknowledge those members who made extraordinary donations last year and designated their gifts to special projects.

We encourage those who are able, to remember the Society in their wills so that this work can continue after we have passed on. Alternatively, members may wish to make significant donations to special projects we are funding, or to our Endowment Fund so that interest from this fund can contribute to our annual operating costs.

Archives Report

This report is general in nature with details to be found in the ongoing reports to the Board during the year and in the Board Meeting minutes. It may be said however that this has been another good year in the operation of our archival center. Visitors and researchers continue to make good use of our facilities and resources.

Volunteers

We continue to rely heavily on our volunteers who number 16-17 persons working on a variety of projects ranging from data entry to organizing archival materials, photograph scanning and many related tasks. This included three or four Columbia Bible College students who did their Field Education work with us.

Family History Collection

Many visitors are searching for genealogical data to enhance their understanding of their family history. During the past year we added 15 family histories to our collection, which totaled over 180 at the end of the year.

Library

We have added a number of books during the past year some of which were donated. A classification and card system has been developed so that books can be managed more efficiently.

Book Sales

Our biggest sellers continue to be the Mennonite Historical Atlas and other books about the Russian Mennonite experience.

Microfilm Collection

We were pleased to receive 109 microfilms along with an extensive index of materials found in the Zaporozhe Regional State Archives from Harvey Dyck. A 1920 census of the Chortitza area villages has already been translated early in 2002.

Translation of some materials found in Fond 6 Inventory 2 from the Odessa Archives was translated by Nikolai Mazharenko, a Ukrainian exchange student.

Computers

We added another computer with printer so that we now have 5 workstations for use by our volunteers and visitors.

Projects & Events - Ongoing projects that have been developing during the year are:

- 1. Photograph acquisition, scanning and indexing with the goal of preserving many old photographs that otherwise might be lost.
- 2. Indexing of obituaries from the Mennonitische Rundschau has proceeded rapidly now including over 7,600 names. This information is available on our website and eventually will be included in Grandma.
- 3. The Genealogy Workshop took place on October 16th with Dr. Tim Janzen as presenter.

Newsletter

The Newsletter of the BC Mennonite Historical Society is one of the primary means of maintaining contact with our members. The Newsletter is sent to people who have contributed at least \$25.00 per year to the BC MHS. Through articles, reports, information and advising our readers of the developments in BC MHS, we seek to further the work and interest in our history.

The Newsletter is making increasing use of photographs from our archives. We also promote upcoming lectures, music and other events of the Society.

We¹ve continued to focus on the history of BC Mennonite communities, on Sardis/Greendale and recently on Renata. We are pleased with the response these articles have produced within our readership. Please contact any of the persons listed below or our office with your suggestions or contributions.

We are grateful for our readers who suggest or write articles, write and contribute to our Newsletter. We invite readers to share their stories with us about the history of their communities and congregations.



AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Directors, The Mennonite Historical Society of British Columbia, Abbotsford, BC

I have reviewed the balance sheet of the Mennonite Historical Society of British Columbia as at December 31, 2001 and the Statement of Receipts and Expenditures and accumulated excess of receipts over expenditures for the year then ended. In so doing, I accepted the statements received from the Society's bank and the holder of its investments and did not conduct independent enquiries. The Society's accounting being conducted on a cash basis, I did not test for any liabilities outstanding as at year-end.

In common with many charitable organizations, the Society derives part of its revenue from the general public in the form of donations and membership fees which are not susceptible to complete verification. Accordingly, my verification of revenue from these sources was limited to a comparison on a test basis of recorded receipts and bank deposits by the Society and I was unable to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to donation revenues and membership fees and their impact on total revenues reported or the accumulated excess of receipts over expenditures.

In my opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, as described above, these financial statements present fairly in all material respects the financial position of the Society as at December 31, 2001. The results of its operations for the year then ended are recorded in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. In my opinion, these principles have been applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year and the bookkeeping and accounting records of the Society are in acceptable condition.

Financial Statements

FINANCIAL REPORT

Through the hard work of our volunteers, the selfless service of our contributors and the generous support of the members, your Society has completed another successful year. These elements have combined to yield a modest surplus for another year, and the Directors thank you all.

Financial Statements for 2001 and a Budget for 2002 are included in this Annual Report for your consideration.

COMMENTS

- 1. The \$15,000. short term investment is temporary surplus cash that can be accessed at any time.
- 2. Long Term Endowment is recorded at cost. The current market value of the securities in the account is approximately \$5,000 more than the amount shown on the statements.
- 3. Excess of revenue over expenditures was \$8,550. for the year. This will become part of Members Equity.
- 4. Interest income shown on the statements was generated by the Endowment Fund.
- 5. Sales of Books etc. includes sales of CD,s, Tapes and Videos. These are unlikely to continue at this level next year. Costs will decrease accordingly.
- 6. Costs of Lectures tend to vary substantially with the nature and style of the event. Musical events tend to be somewhat more expensive than lectures. However, the latter can also vary, if more formal refreshments are included.
- 7. Major items in the Miscellaneous Expense category were the Genealogy Conference and support services for our volunteers and our translator.
- 8. Newsletter costs this year include the cost of mailing, which in prior years was covered by the Postage account.
- 9. The Current Projects item on the Budget for 2002 include another phase of Odessa document retrieval and an as yet unspecified translation project.

SUBSEQUENT EVENT

In March 2002 the Society received a bequest of just under \$25,000. from the estate of the late Agatha Neustaeder. The directors have placed this sum together with a part of our surplus in the Endowment Fund.
